## Games: Vowel Teams

## 1. Happy Family Pairs

Preparation: Each board has 2 spots, each one for a pile of a 4 cardfamily that spells that long vowel sound. Cut out boards and cards on the heavy black lines. Glue the boards and cards onto heavy paper **.
Materials: 4 heavy paper boards, 32 cards, words to glue onto the cards (optional).
Goal: Practice vowel teams and promote sight memory of related words. The purpose of the game is to assemble and match 4 pairs of families (long $\overline{\bar{c}}, \bar{a}, \bar{e}$ and $\bar{u}$ vowels). Before the game starts, the participants should be reminded of the sound each of the vowel signs represents. Rules: (for two players): arrange the boards in front of the players, shuffle the cards, deal each player 4 cards, put the remaining pack aside each card face down. Each time the players exchange one card with each other (face down) trying to assemble a family of four cards of the same spelling of a long vowel sound. After 3 times of exchange in a row the players are allowed to get rid of 2 of their cards and take 2 new cards from the pack. Every time a player assembles a family, he/she notifies the others, names the vowel, reads out the words and places the 4 cards face up in one of the 2 empty spots on a board, then takes 4 new cards from the pack to continue the game.
Rules for three and more players: no need to pick 2 new cards from the pack. Each player exchanges cards with his/her neighbor in a circle two players at a time. Every time a player assembles a family, he/she takes 4 new cards to continue the game. One who matches most of the families wins.
**To save time and effort you can cut the words out of the table below and glue them on cards ready for use. Note: Each table row contains a spelling of a long vowel sound. Enjoy!

Happy Family game:
This is an alternative to the Happy Family Pairs game with the boards. The purpose of this game is just to assemble a family of four cards of the same spelling of a long vowel sound. The first one who assembles a family lays down his/her cards face up saying "Happy family". He/she should name the vowel and read out the assembled words.
